






Investing in Wisconsin Looking ahead



Investing in Wisconsin On the horizon

- US 53, WIS 35 and WIS 16 La Crosse (Letting potential in late 2026)
- I-41, Brown and Outagamie counties (Lets beginning in 2024)
- US 51 Stoughton to McFarland (Lets beginning in November 2023)
- I-39/90/94 Beltline to Wisconsin Dells (Study anticipated 2024)
- Blatnik Bridge (I-535 between Superior and Duluth)
 - Study to complete by end of 2024; potential for construction early as 2027
- I-43, Milwaukee and Ozaukee Counties (Last let July 2023; opening 2024)
- I-94 East/West (Letting potential in 2025)








BIL is anticipated to provide more than \$1 billion increase estimated for Wisconsin roads/bridges over five years




- Putting available resources to work as quickly and effectively as possible

Looking back on 2022


- Talking to counties and locals

- Collaboration with DNR



























Screen shot from STP Local Eligible Roads map



 Allows states to use up to 15% of small urban and rural federal funding allocations on minor collectors and local roads

 - STP Rural
 - Local Entitlement System (LES), a web-based evaluation/approval process
 - STP Local
 - Stakeholder committee including WCHA, Wisconsin Towns Association and League of Wisconsin Municipalities
 - Local Bridge
 - Additional time to obligate funding





On the horizon

- Will be busy next couple years
 - Local programs at historic level
 - Almost \$400M from BIL for local programs in 5-year period
- 2023 Supplemental Solicitation
 - Due March 24 (went out in early November)
 - For Local Bridge, STP-Local and Transportation Alternatives (TAP)
- NEXT Solicitation TBD
 - Likely in spring; getting back to normal cycle
 - Wisconsindot.gov search "NEW BIL Solicitations"





















Lessons learned so far:

- Resolving challenges quickly and effectively is necessary to keep moving forward on time









Emerging best practices

Looking ahead in 2023


- Positioned for continued success







Low-Risk Pilot Phase 1 - Complete

- Initial phase projects were from 2020-25 program cycle
- Last letting was November 2021
- All projects have finished
- UW-Milwaukee report complete

- 31 bridge and road projects in 2020-2025 program cycle
- 20 counties
- 15 let projects to date
















Standardized bridge plans

- Efficiency, consistency, savings






















- All nine projects have been let

Opportunities – bridge

- There are 207 bridges that meet all of the local program eligibility requirements and meet the general geometric parameters (existing bridge span length, bridge width, and skew are within the constraints of what the tool provides) of the standard bridge plans tool.




